

# Code of Conduct — Joliette Elementary School

## This Code of Conduct is in effect as of the 2020-2021 school year

## **Bus Safety and Procedures**

## Please be at your bus stop on time!

- Poor weather or a change in bus drivers can delay the bus' arrival –
   WAIT PATIENTLY!
- Please note that your child may be taking a different numbered bus to return home.

### **SOME BASIC SAFETY RULES:**

- Stand back from the road
- Wait until the bus driver signals you to board
- Sit quietly on the bus
- Nothing goes out of the bus windows (arms, heads, food, papers, etc.)
- Stay seated—do **NOT** stand up on the bus
- **VERY IMPORTANT:** Respect and follow the bus driver's rules
- **Bus transfers:** Student must get off the bus and move to the transfer area as quickly as possible. Students must stand quietly and wait for the next bus. Students must obey the supervisor at all times.

#### OTHER:

• **Joint custody:** Parents who have a joint custody agreement must present a plan to the school that clearly spells out where a child is living and will be transported to/from every school day—this form can be obtain from the school secretary

## **FOOD: Lunches and Snacks**

Students learn better, when a nutritious lunch and snack are brought to school

#### **RECESS SNACKS:**

- Candy, gum, chocolate, and snack with high sugar content are NOT permitted at JES further to the approval of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board's Healthy Schools Policy).
- Students are encouraged to bring vegetables, fruits, cheese, yogurt and homemade muffins or bars

#### LUNCH:

 NO MICROWAVES—this is a safety measure—supervisors cannot be warming up lunches and watching your child(ren)during lunch

## **School Level Special Needs Committee**

The School Level Special Needs Committee (SLSNC) is a committee made up of teachers, resource teachers and the school principal. The role of the SLSNC is to determine the various support measures required for students experiencing learning difficulties. The support measures an individual child receives is based on the report(s) submitted by a psychologist and/or an occupational therapist and/or a speech and language therapist.

**PRIVATE REPORTS:** Please send a copy of the complete report to your child's homeroom teacher, if your child has a report completed by a private psychologist, occupational therapist and/or a speech and language therapist specialist.

## **Guidelines for Homework**

Our school team is continually examining practices at Joliette Elementary School, which help students to achieve their learning goals. We have noticed in recent years that homework is a serious source of stress for both students and parents. Our school finishes late and many children spend hours on the school bus each day, which leaves little time to enjoy family activities.

There is little evidence that homework benefits students in elementary school. Further, our teachers believe that we are able to cover the curriculum within our school hours and that students will succeed with a minimum of written work completed at home.

Therefore, **all written** activities such as:

- Assignments
- Projects
- ELA Worksheets/books
- Math workbooks/sheets

will be completed <u>at</u> school during class time or during study times at recess and lunch.

The only school-related activities that we ask parents to continue at home are:

- Nightly reading
- Studying for quizzes and tests (GHC, Vocabulary, Basic Math Facts)
- Practicing for oral presentations

Reading with your child is important to help improve fluency and build vocabulary. It also creates a bond between parent and child.

## Please continue to read to your child nightly!

Parents who feel that their child would benefit from extra written assignments or practice may contact their teacher(s) for suggested work.

Some teachers may recommend that students with learning challenges require extra time at home to review lessons and practice basic literacy and numeracy skills.

## **ANTI-BULLYING AND ANTI-VIOLENCE PLAN (ABAV)**

Summary for Parents

#### **VIOLENCE**

Refers to any intentional demonstration of verbal, written, physical, psychological or sexual force, which causes distress and injures, hurts, or oppresses a person by attacking their psychological or physical integrity or well-being, or their rights or property.

#### BULLYING

Refers to any <u>repeated</u> direct or indirect behaviour, comment, act, or gesture by the same person or group, whether deliberate or not, including in cyberspace, that occurs in a context where there is a power imbalance between the persons concerned and which causes distress and injures, hurts, oppresses, intimidates or ostracizes.

## **BULLYING CAN TAKE SEVERAL FORMS**

#### **PHYSICAL**

Pushing, hitting, kicking, spitting, taxing (forcing someone to give you property), crowding (entering someone's personal space)

#### **VERBAL**

Insults, teasing, name-calling, threats, racist or sexual/sexist comments.

#### SOCIAL

Excluding others from a group or activity, spreading rumors, taking or hiding property, leaving mean notes or messaging, blaming someone for things they did not do. This is often subtle and hard to detect.

#### **REACTIVE BULLYING**

Being both a victim and a bully, taunting others because of lack of social skills/impulsivity/autism, begins as a victim but may turn into a bully through retaliation or provocative behaviour.

#### CYBER BULLYING

Insults, rumours, harassment spread through social media (Facebook, Twitter, text messages, Instagram, etc...). Posting of videos or photos intended to cause embarrassment. This bullying may not occur at school but affect a student's relationships at school or reinforce other types of bullying at school.

## **Pro-Active Plan to Address Bullying**

- Adult supervision of interactions between children
- Inclusion of anti-bullying lessons in ERC classes
- Joliette Elementary School anti-bullying drama project
- The participation in the Our School survey
- Behaviour tracking system with student reflection sheets
- Anger Management sessions for targeted students through our 5-hour -per week behavior technician
- Student mentoring initiative involving cycles 1 and 3 through which students interact and model positive behavior.

## Everyone is responsible for both preventing and addressing bullying when it occurs

#### STAFF RESPONSIBILITIES

- Put an end to the incident if it is safe or seek appropriate additional help;
- Define the behaviour;
- Declare the expected behaviour;
- Gather relevant information about the situation and those involved;
- Document the incident or file a report
- Report to administration

#### STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- Intervene to stop the situation if you feel safe or go look for an adult immediately;
- Report incidents to an adult that you trust
- Use proper language to address the inappropriate situation
- Refrain from filming incident
- If you hear about an imminent attack/bullying advise an adult

### **PARENT RESPONSIBILTIES**

- Report incidents to the Principal (Please ask for the report form at the office.)
- Encourage your child to stand up/speak up/seek help at school

## **Consequences for Students who Bully or Hurt Others**

- Discussion with an adult to explain why an action is inappropriate.
- Reflection time away from other students
- Loss of privileges: Extra-curricular activities, school social events.

- Involvement in social skills classes
- Community service
- Consequences outlined in the school code of conduct
- In-school and stay-at-home suspensions
- Transfer to other schools
- Expulsion from the school board (very rare for elementary)

## **How to Report Bullying**

- Students should talk with any staff member and continue to speak or seek out an adult until they feel they have been heard
- Students' parents contacting the Principal at extension 5710
- Filling out a report to the school office

<u>In all cases</u>, should documentary evidence (pictures, text messages, notes, etc.) be available, ensure that a copy is remitted to the principal as soon as possible.

## **Restorative Practices**

At Joliette Elementary, we attempt to resolve problems through restorative practice. These are practices which attempt to improve and repair relationships between students by explaining how someone's words or actions have hurt a person and what can be done or said to improve understanding and make a situation better.

## **Questions to Resolve Conflict:**

To be used by staff members

#### RESPONDING TO CHALLENGING BEHAVIOUR...

- What happened?
- What were you thinking of at the time?
- What have you thought about since?
- Who has been affected by what you have done? In what way?
- What do you think you need to do to make things right?

#### TO HELP SOMEONE WHO HAS BEEN HARMED...

- What did you think when you realized what had happened?
- What impact has this incident had on you and others?
- What has been the hardest thing for you?
- What do you think needs to happen to make things right.

#### LORSQUE QUELQUE CHOSE TOURNE MAL...

- Que s'est-il passé?
- À quoi pensais-tu à ce moment?
